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Introduction

The going concern concept has also been assumed. This assumes that the Milton Keynes Reader Service will continue in its present form for at least a year.

Income is only recognised when it is credited to our bank account.

In addition to our grant of £12,444 from Milton Keynes Council, we received a grant of £2,000 from Santander and a grant of £3,000 from a non-public sector grant-awarding organisation which wishes to remain anonymous.

The 'Other Income' category includes match funding of donations received via the localgiving.com website, Gift Aid received via localgiving.com on qualifying donations and interest received on cash reserves. No Gift Aid claim to HMRC was submitted during this financial year, a single claim will be submitted in the next financial year

for donations received in the 2014-15 and 2015-16 financial years.

Service users were invited to make voluntary donations in this financial year rather than paying voluntary user subscriptions. This will allow Gift Aid to be claimed on such donations from those service users who have completed a Gift Aid declaration. Service user donations have been recorded under the 'Donations' category.

Co-ordinator Costs comprise pay, employer pension contributions and Pay As You Earn (PAYE) deductions for income tax & employee National Insurance contributions. As a small employer, the Reader Service was not required to pay employer National Insurance contributions which would otherwise have totalled £854.54.

Broadly, business expenses are those concerned with the delivery of the charity's services to service users, whereas office expenses are those incurred in the administration of the charity. For simplicity and to

reduce administrative burdens, all of the Co-ordinator's expenses are categorised as office expenses even though some are incurred in delivering services.

Other Business Expenses include fees paid to the localgiving.com website, room hire for committee meetings and other events, catering costs for events (all of which were recouped) and Braille transcription services.

Volunteer Training refers to specific attributable expenses associated with the training of volunteers such as room hire for training events, not the full cost of providing training which includes e.g. a proportion of Coordinator costs.

Fixed Assets Account at 31 March 2016

No individual items of equipment exceeding £100 in value were purchased in the financial year. There were therefore no additions to the fixed assets account.

Fixed assets are depreciated over four years. A reducing balance method has been used which is appropriate given that the Reader Service has a relatively small investment in fixed assets compared to its annual income and expenditure.

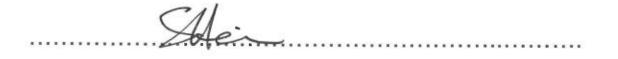
